### COVID-19



### Earthquake

At 7:09 AM MDT on March 18, 2020, a 5.7 magnitude earthquake hit Salt Lake City with an epicenter 6 km (3.7 mi) north-northeast of Magna, Utah. It was the largest earthquake in Utah since 1992. The Bennion Center re-doubled its efforts for disaster preparation by preparing safety kits for students, faculty, and staff.

## A Year in Review: Anti-Racism & Political Discourse

### The Death of George Floyd

On May 25th, 2020, protesters demonstrated in front of police in Salt Lake City. Thousands of people converged in downtown to protest the death of George Floyd.

"Finding a place in the racial equity movement" was our first dialogue held on June 5th, 2020.

# Service Corner

For the 2020-2021 academic year, the Service Corner was located at our new Bennion Center kiosk inside the Kahlert Village residence hall for first-year students. This kiosk now gives us two locations on campus to inspire and mobilize students to strengthen their community by completing projects individually or over Zoom with friends.

This drop-in service program taught new and experienced volunteers the skills needed to complete various take-home service projects. Many of our student leaders started their Bennion Center journey by picking up projects and working on them between classes.

We also introduced Service Corner Nights. These offered virtual, in-person, and hybrid events that addressed a unique community need. Each event partnered with a local school, hospital, or community organization and provided an opportunity for students to work together.

# First-Year Experience Cohort

This program introduced community engagement to first-year and transfer students to prepare them to become student leaders at the Bennion Center. Students discovered positive community impact through their actions and made new friends along the way.

Even with COVID-19 limitations, the FYE Cohort student leaders introduced four new educational events called *Pathways Forums*. Each virtual forum highlighted a different pathway to community engagement by inviting experts to discuss their first-hand experiences. Students learned from each other, shared perspectives, and asked questions about future careers in public service.

# Co-Curricular Programs: Alternative Breaks



The Bennion Center's Alternative Breaks program provides experiential, justice-based opportunities to work with and learn from communities across the western United States. Pre-pandemic, week-long experiences over fall and spring breaks provided much more than just a trip. Participants gained new perspectives and took action in support of social and environmental issues.

This year, a new COVID-conscious format, named AB Lite, was innovated to provide local experiences that allowed students, staff, and faculty the opportunity to continue their social and environmental justice work, while operating within the health guidelines.

Every AB Lite experience had a unique format and schedule to accomodate both virtual and in-person options. None of the planned experiences were cancelled due to COVID-19.

To improve equity and access for all students, this year AB Lite experiences were offered at no cost to participants.

# Co-Curricular Programs: **Utah Reads**

Utah Reads' mission is to provide effective, quality tutoring in reading to elementary aged students at local Title I schools and community organizations. Our goal is to ensure all students have access to educational resources, regardless of socioeconomic status, and to establish a learning environment that encourages students to utilize the strategies and tools they learned in order to be successful in their education.

In response to COVID-19, Utah Reads successfully pivoted from primarily on-site and in-person tutoring to modalities that were highly effective and physically distanced.


### Virtual Tutoring

Utah Reads tutors had to adapt quickly to change lesson plans and gain proficiency in various forms of digital technology to provide guality tutoring. 66 elementary school students attended weekly.

### **Educational Reading Kits**

During the summer of 2020, Utah Reads staff, site leaders, and tutors came together to create a new reading kit project. This included a new website for signup and resources to ensure their elementary students continued their learning and personal connection to their tutors during the pandemic.

Each kit had a unique theme and included a wide range of items that provided fun educational and reading experiences with lesson plans tailored to kindergarten through fifth-grade students. These kits were delivered to our site partner, Glendale Community Learning Center, througout the academic year.

### "Read Aloud" YouTube Videos

Utah Reads tutors embraced YouTube to create "Read Aloud" videos that featured them reading children's books, some familiar, and some new. An example of a new book title included, *King Covid*, a children's story about COVID-19.



#### Educational Kit Themes

Summer Break, Art Discovery, STEM Exploration, Creative Writing, Social Justice, and Back to School, Technology and Learning Styles, Pandemic Heroes, Our Government, and Spring Around the World.

Utah Reads tutors must be eligible for Federal Work-Study to receive an hourly pay rate and work between 6-20 hours per week. Tutors also have the opportunity to complete an AmeriCorps term and receive an additional \$1,300 stipend.

These community-minded students explored their creative interests, developed new skills, gained real-life experience, collaborated internally, and strengthened their community through storytelling.

# **CEL Designated Courses**

Community Engaged Learning (CEL) involves students, faculty, and community partners working together to apply knowledge in authentic settings in order to address community needs while also meeting instructional objectives. CEL enhances and deepens students' understanding of an academic discipline by facilitating the integration of theory and practice. This high impact teaching method provides students with experiences that develop life skills, with opportunities to engage in critical reflection, and with the intellectual space to understand and contribute to the public purpose of their chosen major or discipline.


# *Curricular Programs:* **Community Engagement Certificate**

This new academic credential was created this year to compliment any major or minor and helps students develop the skills necessary to lead positive community change. It offers sustained and highly engaged coursework, including a capstone community experience, that is purpose-driven and action-oriented. Students pursuing this certificate address complex social and environmental challenges.



Earning this certificate requires the completion of 21 credit hours, and is open to all undergraduates and all majors at the U. There are no specific admission requirements. Students interested in declaring for this certificate can begin by enrolling in BENN 2020: Pathways to Community Engagement or BENN 2030: Intro to Civic Leadership.

# The Community Research Collaborative (CRC)



The Bennion Center participated and supported the U's Community Research Collaborative which is composed of researchers, activists, educators, and community leaders, who work together to advance quality participatory and action-oriented community-based research. The group and its products are supported by the Bennion Center and University Neighborhood Partners.

The Bennion Center proudly supports and encourages quality community-based research (CBR). We helped produce and publish "IN IT TOGETHER": Community-Based Research Guidelines for Communities and Higher Education.

# Carnegie Community Engagement Classification

The University of Utah received the Carnegie Community Engagement Classification, an elective designation that indicates institutional commitment to community engagement by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. The Bennion Center's curricular and co-curricular programs were highlighted in the University of Utah's application.

This nationally recognized classification is awarded following a process of self-study by each institution, which is then assessed by a national review committee. The classification has been the leading framework for institutional assessment and recognition of community engagement in U.S. higher education for the past 14 years.



# Distinguished Faculty Service Award

This award honors a faculty member who has demonstrated long-term commitment to the campus-community connection. The annual award winner has shown sustained dedication to community service, and the integration of service with research and teaching, beyond the traditional roles of faculty. This award is possible through the generous endowment gift from Dr. David M. Jabusch, professor emeritus, Department of Communication, and Susan Jabusch. A gift of \$1,000 is donated to the award winner's non-profit organization of choice.



### Dr. Cathleen Zick

Professor in the Family & Consumer Studies Department, College of Social and Behavioral Sciences

During her 39 years of teaching and scholarship at the U, she served as Director of the Masters in Public Policy Program, the Dean of the College of Social and Behavioral Science, and as Department Chair of Family and Consumer Studies. As her nominators shared, Professor Zick's "integration of research, service, and teaching has provided real and long-lasting relationships" for students and community partners. Professor Zick donated the \$1,000 award to Wasatch Community Gardens because, "their efforts span children's summer camps, job training for women experiencing homelessness, community gardens, and workshops—all with an emphasis on promoting equity, diversity, and inclusion within our local community."

# Public Service Professorship Award

This award is designed to support project-based solutions that strengthen community engaged learning experiences and opportunities, while also fostering sustainable partnerships with the local community. The faculty recipient of this award receives \$7,500 to invest in their project-based efforts, made possible by the generous support of the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs. Award winning proposals must be interdisciplinary, must combine teaching with research and action, and must provide long-term positive community impact in close collaboration with a community partner.



### Milad Hosseini-Mozari

Professor in the Multi-Disciplinary Design (MDD) Program, College of Architecture and Planning

Professor Hosseini-Mozari has utilized this award to launch an innovation hub between the MDD Program and the International Rescue Committee (IRC). It will be a collaborative space where digital access and increased tech literacy will be supported for a community that has historically experienced inequity in technological access. Professor Hosseini-Mozari comes from the community of focus, as an immigrant himself, and will serve as a bridge between students and refugees to build technological know-how and amplify immigrant voices resulting in meaningful benefits to the immigrant community.

# *Curricular Programs:* **Bennion Scholars**

Bennion Scholars applied their academic interests to meet a real community need through a capstone project with a community partner and faculty mentor. Courage and optimism sustain Scholars' endeavours to learn through inclusive collaboration on projects that support and develop innovative action within all communities.

Despite the pandemic impacting every single project plan, 16 students completed their Bennion Scholar Capstone Projects in the 2020-2021 academic year.

strongly committed to providing equity in access to our programs—both curricular and co-curricular.


This past year, fundraising efforts focused on this important initiative through end-of-year annual appeals, U Giving Day, endowments, grants, donor outreach, and more.
