STUDY ABROAD SURVEY, SUMMER 2007 Kari Ellingson, Associate Vice President for Student Development August 14, 2007

During the summer 2007 orientation sessions, students and their parents were asked to complete a short survey of their international experiences and their perceptions of study abroad.

METHOD

Three different surveys were prepared with overlapping questions for 1) Freshman, 2) Parents and 3) Transfer students. Each survey took approximately three minutes to complete. These surveys were distributed and collected during the orientations in a paper version. The completed surveys were then entered into Student Voice.

RESULTS (Survey and results attached)

A. Freshman, n = 1150

Surveys were collected from 1150 entering freshman who attended both the Overnight Orientations and the One-Day Orientations. Sixty-six percent of freshmen enter the University with some experience outside of the U.S., primarily from travel, with 12% having participated in an international experience as part of a High School program. Those who have spent time outside of the country have a much higher interest in study abroad than those who have never left the U.S. with 75% of those who have left the country have a Very Strong or Somewhat Strong interest compared to 58% for those who have never left the U.S. A high percentage of all students rate their interest in Study Abroad as Very Strong (32%) or Somewhat Strong (37%). Interestingly, 50% say they would prefer to spend one to two semesters abroad, rather than participate in a shorter program. More telling is that, of those whose interest is Very Strong, 73% would prefer to spend one or two semesters abroad.

When asked about types of programs which would be of interest, 59% were interested in international internships, as opposed to 33% who marked academic coursework, and 23% for service-oriented programs. Thirty-one percent stated they were fluent or somewhat fluent in another language. When asked about barriers preventing them from pursing Study Abroad, the primary concern was financial with 46% listing this as the major impediment. This was particularly true for those who indicated a very or somewhat strong interest in pursing study abroad. For those who said they had weak or no interest, their biggest factor, not surprisingly, was "Lack of Interest".

Differences exist between the students who attend the Overnight Orientation and those who attend the One-Day Orientation. Forty-one percent of the former group indicated a Very Strong interest in Study Abroad compared to 25% of the latter. They were twice as likely to have studied abroad during high school (17% versus 8%). There appears to be little difference in strength of study abroad

interest by race/ethnicity. However, women tend to have a stronger interest in study abroad with 43% indicating very strong interest in study abroad with only 19% of men doing so.

B. Parents, n = 337

Three-hundred and thirty-seven parents who attended orientation in conjunction with their entering freshman completing the survey. In general, they are well-traveled with 81% having been outside of the U.S., primarily for travel but 12% went outside of the U.S. for work and 8% with the military. While 63% saw study abroad as desirable and realistic, only 23% of these said their child definitely or probably would study abroad. Another 49% said their child 'might" study abroad. Twenty-three percent indicated a low or no possibility of this happening. The major factor in preventing this was financial concern with 54% indicating money as the major impediment. Next was lack of information (12%), doesn't relate to major (12%) and lack of interest (9%). Similar to their students, the preferred length of study abroad was one or two semesters (79%) and participation in an internship (58%). A frequently expressed reason for not studying abroad was participation in an athletic sport.

Not surprisingly, there seems to be a direct correlation between parental education and indication of study abroad plans. In looking at the parents who marked a 4 or 5 with 5 being "Will Definitely Study Abroad", no one who indicated little or no high school endorsed these responses. This percentage increases to 12.5% for those who had graduated from high school, 14.6% for those with some college, 21.9% for a two-year degree, 22,5% for a four-year degree and 30.8% for those with post graduate education. Although these responses might appear to financially-driven, parents with more formal education endorsed "financial concerns" more often as a factor for NOT studying abroad that those with less formal education.

In addition, 32.4% of parents who attended the Overnight Orientations endorsed that their child would probably or would definitely study abroad while only 18% of parents who attended the One-Day Orientations were as definite with regard to study abroad plans.

C. Transfer Students, n = 135

Slightly lower than freshman, 64% of transfer students are coming to the University with experience outside of the U.S. Thirty percent of students have been abroad with church service while 16% have had family who lived outside of the U.S. Nine percent have participated in a study abroad program or internship for credit. As opposed to freshman, where 69% indicate a very or somewhat strong interest in study abroad, only 56% of transfer student indicate this level of interest. Of those who have never been outside the U.S., only 36% ranked their interest in study abroad as very or somewhat strong as opposed to 66% for those who have been outside of the U.S. Although financial concerns are a primary factor the student might NOT study abroad (40%), work obligations (13%), family

obligations (30%) and delay of graduation (11%) are also major concerns. Forty-five percent would like a program of less than two months. Forty-seven percent would most prefer this in the form of an internship. Forty percent of respondents are married and 17% have children under 18 living at home. Thirty-seven percent are fluent in another language.

APPLICATION

The above data has been included in *Student Internationalization: Expanding study abroad programs at the University of Utah*, a report presented to President Michael Young in an effort to increase the number of students participating in study abroad programs. As a direct result of the assessment, several recommendations have been included:

- 1. Ensure that Study Abroad programs have an active presence at every Orientation, beyond staffing a "table" along with other service providers. Highlight Study Abroad options with a brief presentation at all orientations and have this office be a stop on the campus tour. Specific attention should be paid to students participating in Overnight Orientations since this population seems particularly open to the possibility.
- 2. Develop an expanded spectrum of possible of programs including traditional study abroad, expanding service learning, and integrating internships.
- 3. Increase promotion of semester or year-long programs.
